Weight: 0.58 g. Since only approx. 2/3 of the coin remains, original weight was perhaps 0.87 g.

Diameter: 12 mm.

SF 101; 10 m² 404E240S: unstratified.

A sceatta of the 'London derived' series (L). The reverse is similar but not identical to BMC 34. The obverse is too corroded for comparison.

12 Anglo-Saxon c. 740-750.

Silver sceatta. (Fig. 9)

Obverse: Fantastic bird to right, its wings extended above, a branch in front.

Reverse: Fantastic beast to right with large claws and long tail.

Weight: 0.617 g. Diameter: 11 mm.

Condition good.

SF 61; 410.75E249.6S.F45.1

An East Anglian sceatta, Rigold's series Q, broadly contemporary with the runic sceattas (R), but with a much wider distribution (Rigold 1977, 25). Compare *BMC* 44 where the beast is facing the opposite way.

13 Kent, Cuthred 798-807

Silver penny, moneyer Duda. (Fig. 9)

Obverse: Diademmed bust right, CVÐRED REX CANT̄.

Reverse: Cross pommée with wedges in angles, +DVDA MONETA.

Weight: 1.35 g. Diameter: 19 mm.

In very good condition.

SF 102; 409E259.1S: layer R02.

Cuthred's portrait coins (Group II, cross-and-wedges type) were minted in the last three years of his reign (*BNJXXXII*, 1963, 65). The moneyer Duda is already known from Cuthred's coins, but both the obverse and reverse dies for this coin are new. Cuthred's brother,
